

Victim's Perspective

Rape Trauma Syndrome:

Physical, Psychological & Behavioural symptoms

Immediate Response: Controlled, Expressed, Mixed

Outward Adjustment Phase: Readjustment, continued changes to lifestyle, persistent physical symptoms, phobias, OCDs, agoraphobia.

Post Traumatic Stress syndrome

The person has been exposed to a traumatic event in which both of the following were present:

- The person experienced, witnessed or was confronted with an event that involved actual or threatened death of serious injury
- The person's response involved fear, helplessness or horror



PTSD

- Recurrent and intrusive distressing recollections, including images, thoughts or perceptions.
- Acting or feeling as if the traumatic event were recurring.
- Intense psychological distress at exposure to cues that symbolise or resemble an aspect of the traumatic event.



Victim's Perspective

- Efforts to avoid thoughts, feelings or conversations associated with the trauma.
- Inability to recall an important aspect of the trauma.
- Feeling of detachment or estrangement from others.
- Restricted range of affect
- Sense of foreshortened future.
- Difficulty falling or staying asleep.
- Irritability or outbursts of anger.
- Hyper-vigilance.



'Victim Blaming'

- Effective management of victims experiencing coercive control relies on the:
- Skills
- Insight
- Experience of professionals, and
- Ability to move beyond 'victim blaming'.



 Direction and Guidance for the 43 Police Force of England, Wales and Northern Ireland



Underpinning Principles

 That victims have got a fundamental right to be believed;

 Putting victims, their safety (safeguarding) and well-being at the heart of our responses and investigations; and

 That the victim's personal details will be stored, managed and handled with integrity and confidentially.



NPCC Strategy cont'd....

NPCC's 2015 HBA Strategy (A Policing Strategy for E, W & NI. Eradicating HBA, FM & FGM Together)

- Strategic Intention:

The police service is committed to playing a key role within the *coalition* of *partners* in *eradicating* honour based abuse, forced marriage and female genital mutilation, *increasing the confidence of victims*, survivors & affected communities and in identifying, prosecuting and bringing offenders to justice.



NPCC New Definition

New NPCC definition: Honour Based Abuse is:

'an incident or crime involving violence, threats of violence, intimidation, coercion or abuse (including psychological, physical, sexual, financial or emotional abuse), which has or may have been committed to protect or defend the honour of an individual, family and or community for alleged or perceived breaches of the family and / or community's code of behaviour'.

(NPCC Strategy 2015-2018).



Four Key Priorities of NPCC's Strategy

Prevention

Protection (Safeguarding)

Partnership

Prosecution



Safeguarding

 Protecting and safeguarding women, girls, boys and men from affected communities (which practice harmful practices) is EVERYONE'S RESPONSIBILITY including prosecutors, other legal professionals, law enforcement professionals, social care and health care professionals and civil society organisations.

It is a Team effort by people who CARE.



Risk controls through legislation

- Section 71 Serious Crime Act 2015 Provides FGM victims life long anonymity
- Section 173 Policing and Crime Act 2017 inserts a section 122A into Part 10 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 – Provides FM victim life long anonymity.

However, caveats linked to:

- the defendant's defence.
- the public interest,
- and in relation to publications consent has been given by the victim aged 16 years or over, and
- the lack of the defendant's knowledge.
- Witness anonymity is also provided by Coroners and Justice Act 2009.

Youth Justice and Criminal Evidence Act 1999

Section 73 - FGM Protection Orders

Forced Marriage (Civil Protection) Act 2007 –
FM Protection Orders – 25th November 2008



HBA - The real challenge for Public Authorities

- Vastly under-reported and requiring victim, survivor and community confidence
- Attitude Culture of Public Authorities. Capacity
- Aptitude Knowledge, Capability and Ability
- Appetite Protection for all must be a priority. This is non- negotiable.



Prosecution


 Former National Police Lead: "A criminal justice approach in isolation will not eradicate FGM; that can only be done with the police, health, education, social care, NGOs and the affected communities working together for this common aim". (Cmdr [Rtd] Mak Chishty QPM)

• Sir James Munby President Family Division: "The courts alone, whether the family courts or the criminal courts, cannot eradicate this great evil (FGM) but they have an important role to play and a very much greater role than they have hitherto been able to play". (2015)



A Partnership Approach

Home Affairs Select Committee Report (Sept '16): "FGM Prevention often requires collaboration between health, social care, education & LE sectors". However I believe it means more than this:





Community Driven Solutions

 Communities must want to change their practices, the solutions to sustained prevention and eradication rests within affected communities (recognised in HASC Report: FGM – abuse un-checked – 9th report for session 2016/17)

What it is NOT:

- Mediation
- Accessing the community through gatekeepers
- Paralegal systems, controlled by men e.g. Beth Din, Shariah
